
# To the Halls of Faison School





2. To foster a spirit of democracy among our students


3. To develop self-control and self-reliance



The 1949 Senior Class has had an enjoyable and interesting four years of high school. In many ways they have been more eventful years in and out of school than most classes can boast of.



#### FAISON GRIDIRON HISTORY

Football in our high school is still in its infancy, though the record of its two brief seasons does not indicate that our boys have played like infants.

When Coach Fouts! Bulldogs met Swansboro in September 1947 for their first match game, many people felt that it was the realization of a dream, because the students and town people wanted for a long time to see Faison High School have a football team. The initial cost of uniforms and equipment looked almost too great, but many friends of the school gave their support, and with careful management by Coach Fouts, he came out debt-free at the end of the first year. The wins and losses for that year were about half and half.

The Bulldogs lost their first game of the 1948 season to Mt. Olive by a score of 33-0. Elizabethtown nosed them out with a score of 18-0. Burgaw took the victory in the third game by 19-0. Erwin won over them by the same score. Goldsboro Jr. Varsity was better by 18-6, and Swansboro toppled them by 41-6. The Bulldogs partly redeemed their losses by defeating Hallsboro 14-0, edging out Farmville 14-13, and holding the favored New Bern Bears to a 6-6 tie. The latter was the kind of muddy thriller with which a team likes to wind up its season.

Coach Fouts and his Bulldogs deserve the highest praise for the good gridiron record they have made, even against stronger and highly favored teams. The boys had to meet some of their toughest teams with several of their boys out because of injuries and illness.
