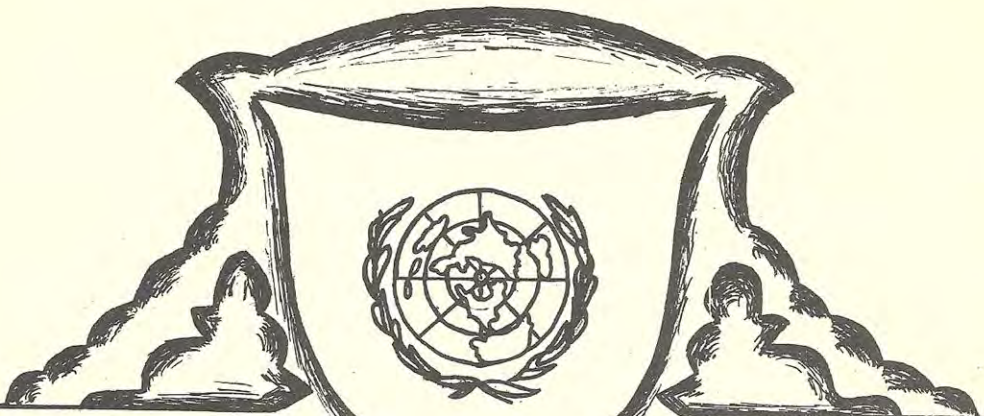
Foreword

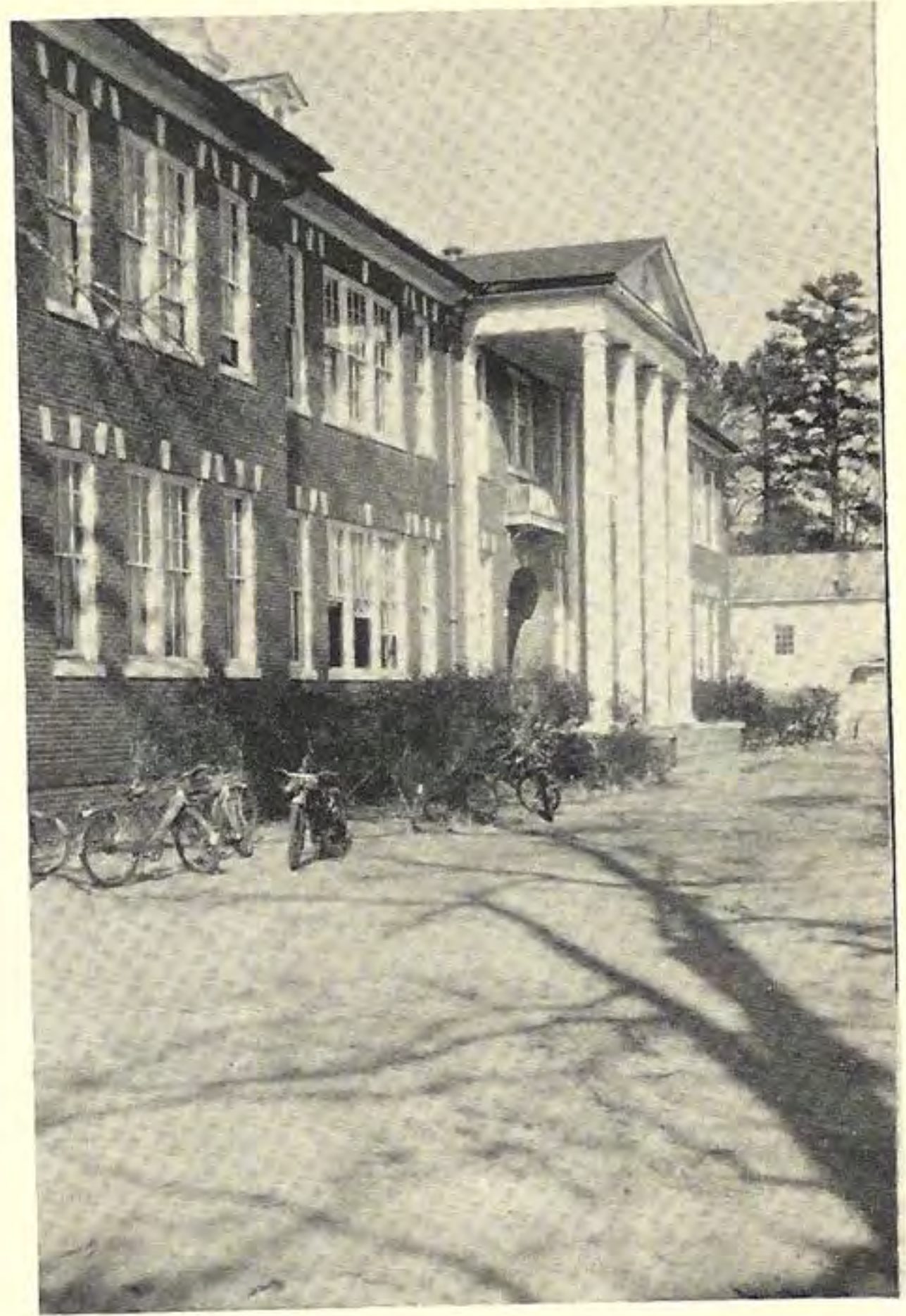

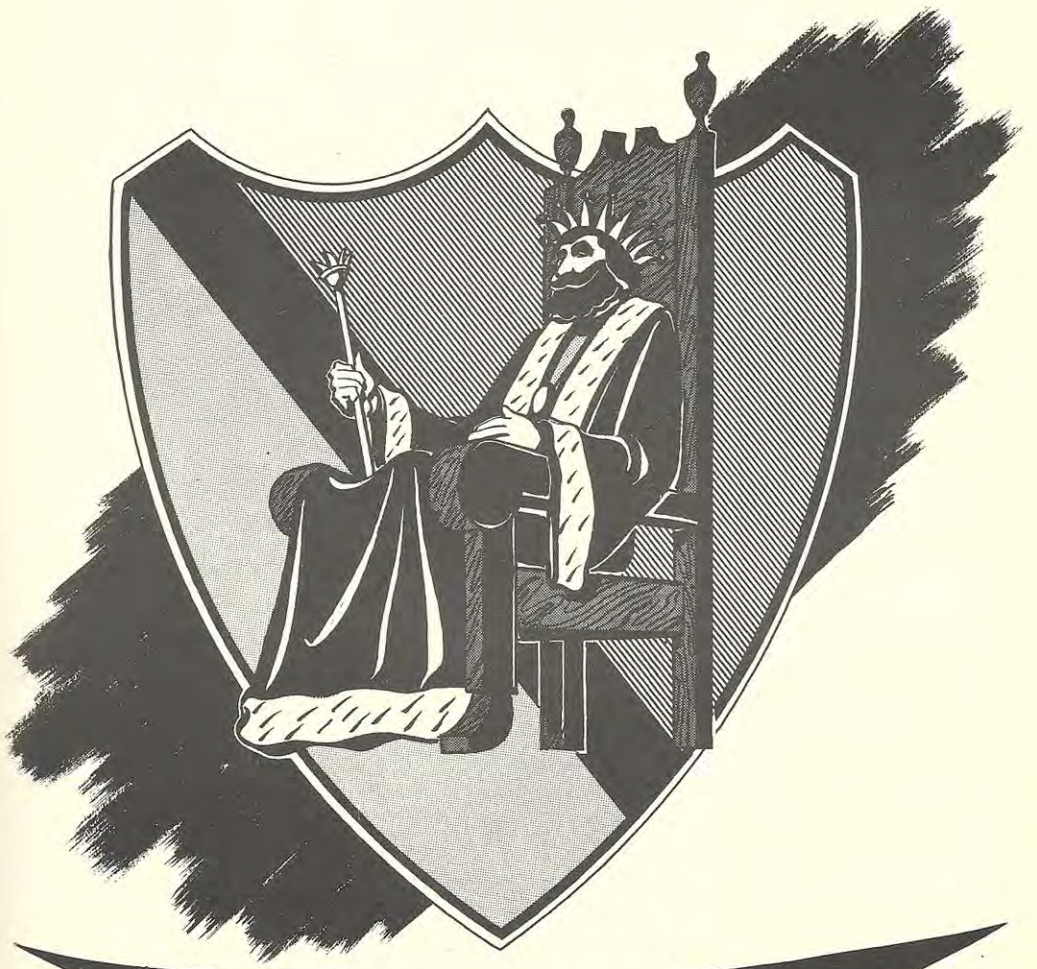

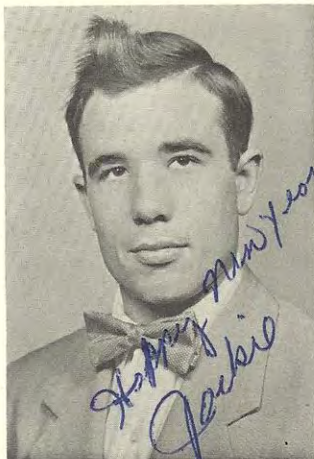

Class History

There were happy days climaxed by eighth grade graduation in May, 1946, at which time we really felt grown up and were all ready for high school.

Another high spot of our junior year was the presentation of our class play, "The Cannibal Queen". It was really a lot of work, but a great deal of fun.

Now all of our grammar grade and most of our high school days are history. Even half of our senior year is gone. We are only nineteen in number now. Edith Armstrong went to summer school and beat us to graduation. Junior Batchelor answered the beckoning call of Little Old New York City and left us. Emma Jean Justice got married at Thanksgiving and moved to Kinston to live. Curtiss should have let her wait and graduate with us. To partly offset our losses, Roy Herring, formerly of Lumberton, joined us. He has proved himself a valuable student and we feel that he has always been one of us.

No, it doesn't seem possible that we are so near graduation. Our feelings are those of mixed opposite emotions, joy, and sorrow. It seems wonderful to sit in the Senior seats, to occupy the back seats in chapel, and to be the recipients of all the Senior honors. When one is a Senior things have a little more meaning, or are a little more important. For example, that barbecue supper the boys gave us in the fall and that other one at Griffin's the week after the Senior Play, were both a little more special since we were Seniors.

"When Irish Eyes Are Smiling" was our Senior Play, and that fact gave it added prestige.

By the time this book shall have come off press it will be almost time for the curtain to close on the class of '51. With a feeling of sorrow and regret for our errors of commission and omission, with a deep sense of gratitude to our teachers who have been our guides and inspiration, and with a heart full of love and good will to our schoolmates and Alma Mater, we reluctantly take our leave. Who said, "It was all fun to be Seniors!"

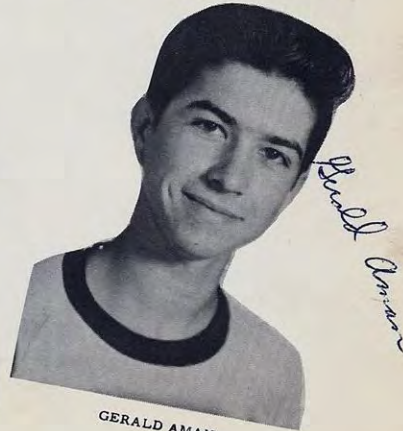

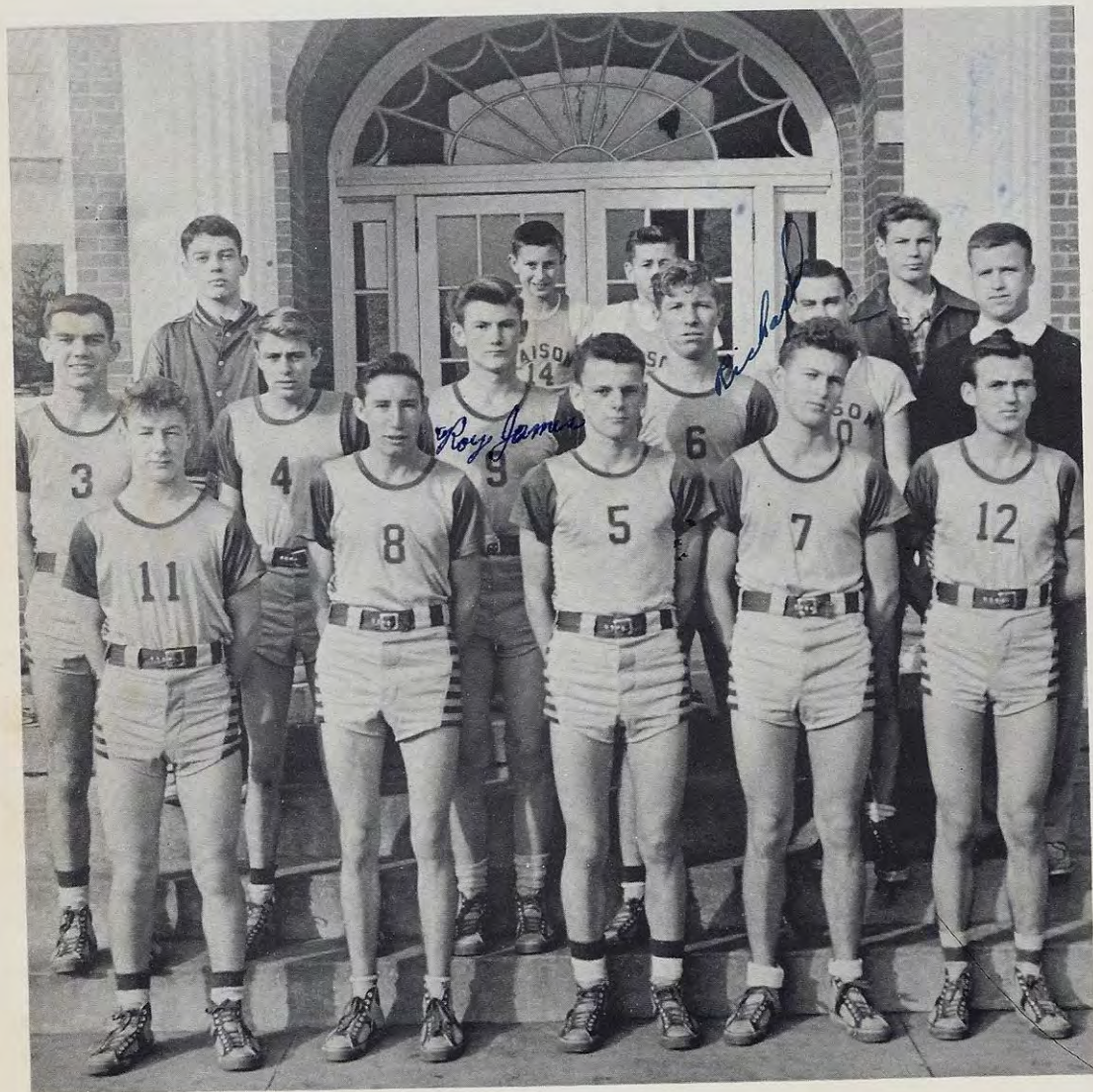

BASEBALL

The 1950 baseball season was a good one. When it ended, the Volcanoes were in second place in the conference. They had a 5-5 record for the season. FOOTBALL

This year the Volcanoes opened the season with a new coach, and a rebuilding job. There were only seven boys that had played football before. The season got underway when the Vols were stopped by LaGrange 19 to 12. The next week Mt. Olive was on the better end of a score 18-0. 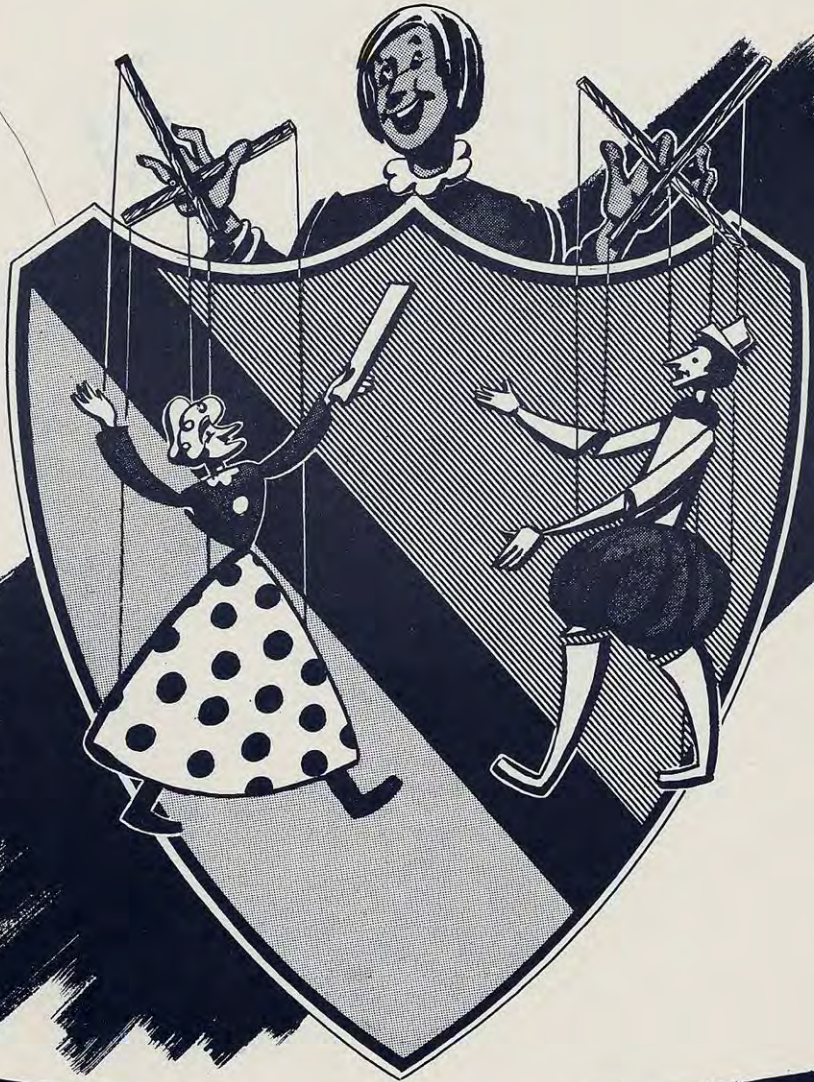
BOYS' BASKETBALL

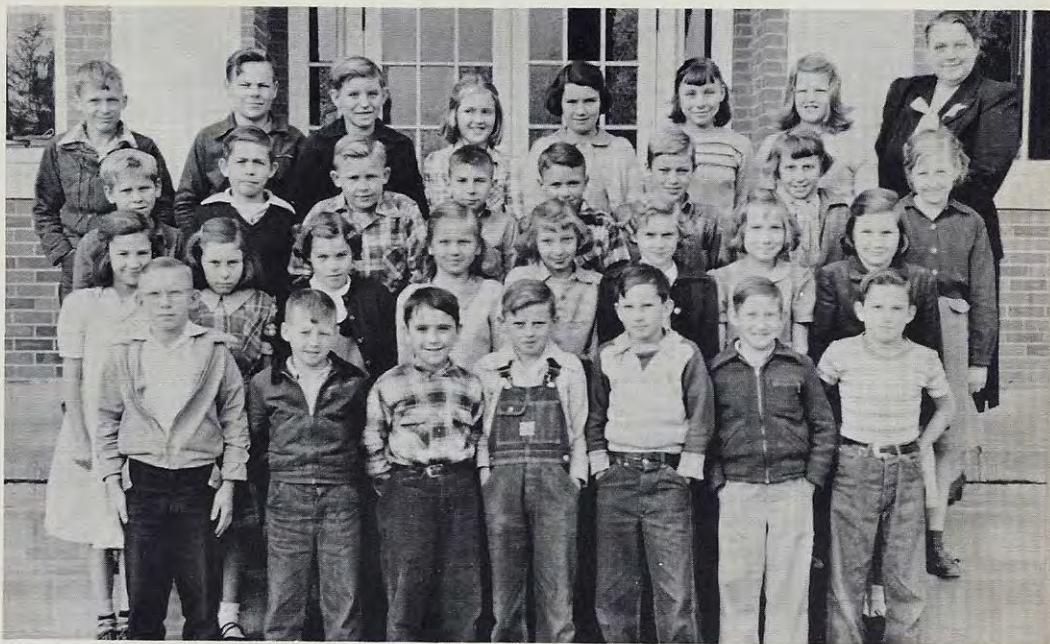

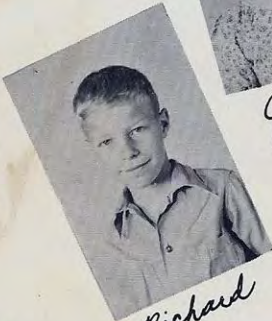
